These marking instructions have been prepared by examination teams for use by Qualifications Scotland appointed markers when marking external course assessments.

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General marking principles for National 5 Geography

This information is provided to help you understand the general principles you must apply when marking candidate responses to questions in this paper. These principles must be read in conjunction with the detailed marking instructions, which identify the key features required in candidate responses.

- (a) Marks for each candidate response must **always** be assigned in line with these general marking principles and the detailed marking instructions for this assessment.
- (b) Marking should always be positive. This means that, for each candidate response, marks are accumulated for the demonstration of relevant skills, knowledge and understanding: they are not deducted from a maximum on the basis of errors or omissions.
- (c) If a specific candidate response does not seem to be covered by either the principles or detailed marking instructions, and you are uncertain how to assess it, you must seek guidance from your team leader.
- (d) For credit to be given, points must relate to the question asked.
- (e) There are six types of question used in this question paper, namely
 - A Describe . . .
 - B Explain . . .
 - C Give reasons . . .
 - D Match . . .
 - E Give map evidence . . .
 - F Give advantages and/or disadvantages . . .

For each of these question types, the following provides an overview of marking principles and an example of their application.

A Questions that ask candidates to *Describe* . . . (4-6 marks)

Candidates must make a number of relevant, factual points. These should be key points. The points do not need to be in any particular order. Candidates may provide a number of straightforward points or a smaller number of developed points, or a combination of these.

Up to the total mark allocation for this question

- award **1 mark** for each accurate relevant point
- award **further marks** for development and exemplification.

For example

Question: Describe, in detail, the effects of two of the factors shown. (Modern factors affecting farming.)

Response: New technology has led to increased crop yields, (**1 mark**) leading to better profits for some farmers. (**second mark for development**)

B Questions that ask candidates to *Explain* . . . (4-6 marks)

Candidates must make a number of points that make the process/situation plain or clear, for example by showing connections between factors or causal relationships between events or processes. These should be key reasons and may include theoretical ideas. There is no need for any prioritising of these reasons. Candidates may provide a number of straightforward reasons or a smaller number of developed reasons, or a combination of these. The command word 'explain' is generally used when candidates are required to demonstrate knowledge and understanding.

Award up to full marks for sufficiently accurate and detailed, fully labelled diagrams.

Up to the total mark allocation for this question

- award **1 mark** for each accurate relevant point
- award **further marks** for developed explanations.

For example

Question: Explain the formation of a U-shaped valley.

Response: A glacier moves down a main valley which it erodes (**1 mark**) by plucking, where the ice freezes on to fragments of rock and pulls them away. (**second mark for development**)

C Questions that ask candidates to *Give reasons* . . . (4-6 marks)

Candidates must make a number of points that make the process/situation plain or clear, for example by showing connections between factors or causal relationships between events or processes. These should be key reasons and may include theoretical ideas. There is no need for any prioritising of these reasons. Candidates may provide a number of straightforward reasons or a smaller number of developed reasons, or a combination of these. The command words 'give reasons' are generally used when candidates are required to use information from sources.

Up to the total mark allocation for this question

- award **1 mark** for each accurate relevant point
- award **further marks** for developed reasons.

For example

Question: Give reasons for the differences in the weather conditions between Belfast and Stockholm.

Response: In Stockholm it is dry but in Belfast it is wet, because Stockholm is in a ridge of high pressure whereas Belfast is in a depression. (**1 mark**) Belfast is close to the warm front and therefore experiencing rain. (**Second mark for development**)

D Questions that ask candidates to *Match* . . . (3-4 marks)

Candidates must match two sets of variables by using their map interpretation skills.

Up to the total mark allocation for this question

- award **1 mark** for each correct answer.

For example

Question: Match the letters A to C with the correct features.

Response: A = forestry. (**1 mark**)

E Questions that ask candidates to *Give map evidence* . . . (3-4 marks)

Candidates must look for evidence on the map and make clear statements to support their answer.

Up to the total mark allocation for this question

- award **1 mark** for each correct statement.

For example

Question: Give map evidence to show that part of Coventry's CBD is located in grid square 3379.

Response: Many roads meet in this square. (1 mark)

F Questions that ask candidates to *Give advantages and/or disadvantages* . . . (4-6 marks)

Candidates must select relevant advantages or disadvantages of a proposed development and show understanding of their significance to the proposal. Answers may give briefly explained points or a smaller number of developed points. Award marks for accurate map evidence.

Up to the total mark allocation for this question

- award **1 mark** for each accurate relevant point
- award **further marks** for developed points.

For example

Question: Give either advantages or disadvantages of this location for a shopping centre. You must use map evidence to support your answer.

Response: There are roads and motorways close by allowing the easy delivery of goods (1 mark) and access for customers, (second mark for development) for example the A46, M6 and M69.

If more than one feature is explained, mark them all and award marks for the highest scoring feature.	5	If Corrie is chosen: • snow accumulates in a hollow and compresses turning to ice (1 mark) The ice/glacier moves downhill due to gravity and erodes the land (1 mark) • the ice erodes the rock by plucking and abrasion (1 mark) • plucking is when the ice freezes onto rocks and when the ice moves it rips the rocks out (1 mark) • abrasion is when rocks frozen in the ice scrape away the landscape as the glacier moves (1 mark) • these processes make the hollow wider and steeper (1 mark) • freeze thaw action breaks down rocks when water enters a crack, freezes and expands many times (1 mark) causing material to be incorporated into the ice increasing erosion (1 mark) • the rotational movement of the glacier over deepens the hollow creating a rock lip (1 mark) • the ice melts leaving an over-deepened hollow with a steep-backed wall (1 mark) Or any other valid point. If Pyramidal Peak is chosen: • snow accumulates in hollows and compresses turning to ice, forming glaciers (1 mark) The ice moves downhill due to gravity and erodes the land (1 mark) • A pyramidal peak forms when three or more corries form around a mountain (1 mark) • the glaciers eroded backwards towards each other removing rocks (1 mark) using the processes of plucking and abrasion (1 mark) • plucking is when the ice freezes onto rocks and when the ice moves it rips the rocks out (1 mark)

					• abrasion is when rocks frozen in the ice scrape away the landscape as the glacier moves (1 mark) • as the glaciers erode backwards into the mountain the corries get bigger forming sharp arêtes which meet at a pyramidal peak (1 mark) • freeze-thaw weathering erodes the top of the mountain creating a jagged peak (1 mark) Or any other valid point. If U-Shaped Valley is chosen: • snow accumulates in a hollow and compresses turning to ice forming a glacier (1 mark) The ice moves downhill due to gravity and erodes the land (1 mark) • the glacier flows through a V-shaped river valley eroding it (1 mark) by the processes of plucking and abrasion (1 mark) • plucking is when the ice freezes onto rocks and when the ice moves it rips the rocks out (1 mark) • abrasion is when rocks frozen in the ice scrape away the landscape as the glacier moves (1 mark) • freeze thaw action breaks down rocks when water enters a crack, freezes and expands many times (1 mark) causing material to be incorporated into the ice increasing erosion (1 mark) • these processes make the valley wider and deeper (1 mark) • the ice melts leaving a flat-floored U-shaped valley (1 mark) Or any other valid point.

Award a maximum of 1 mark for a list of processes. Award a maximum of 3 marks for erosion processes including the list. No marks awarded for ox-bow lake or gorge. If more than one feature is explained, mark them all and award marks for the highest scoring feature.	5	Answers will depend on the feature selected: If Meander is chosen: • rivers rarely flow in a straight channel resulting in water flowing from side to side (meandering) (1 mark) • water in the river flows faster on the outside eroding the riverbank (1 mark) to form a river cliff (1 mark) • the cliff is undercut by hydraulic action and corrasion (1 mark) • corrasion/abrasion is caused by bedload carried in the fast flow, rubbing against the bank wearing it away (1 mark) • hydraulic action also takes place where water gets into small cracks forcing pieces of rock to break off the riverbed and banks (1 mark) • on the inside bend the river flows more slowly causing it to deposit some of its load (1 mark) forming a slip-off slope/river beach (1 mark) • continual erosion on the outer bank and deposition on the inner bank forms a meander (1 mark) Or any other valid point. If waterfall is chosen: • waterfalls are found where hard rock overlies softer rock (1 mark) for example granite overlies mudstone (1 mark) • the water is powerful and erodes the softer rock more quickly than the harder rock (1 mark) • the river erodes through the processes of hydraulic action, corrosion and corrasion (1 mark) • corrasion/abrasion is caused by bedload carried in the fast flow rubbing against the rock wearing it away (1 mark)

					• hydraulic action also takes place where water gets into small cracks forcing pieces of rock to break off the riverbed and banks (1 mark) • the softer rock is worn away forming a plunge pool and the harder rock is undercut (1 mark) • an overhang of hard rock is left suspended above the plunge pool (1 mark) • this collapses as there is nothing to support it and the rock falls into the plunge pool (1 mark) • rock fragments swirling around deepen the plunge pool (1 mark) • this process is repeated over a long period of time and the waterfall retreats upstream (1 mark) Or any other valid point. If V-Shaped valley is chosen: • a river flows downhill eroding the landscape vertically (1 mark) • the river erodes by hydraulic action and corrasion/abrasion (1 mark) cutting a deep notch/gully in the hillside (1 mark) • corrasion/abrasion is caused by bedload carried in the fast flow rubbing against the rock wearing it away (1 mark) • hydraulic action also takes place where water gets into small cracks forcing pieces of rock to break off the riverbed (1 mark) • the sides of the valley are exposed to freeze-thaw weathering which loosens the rocks and steepens the valley sides (1 mark) • the rocks which fall into the river aid the process of corrasion/abrasion increasing erosion (1 mark) • the river transports the rocks downstream and the channel becomes wider and deeper (1 mark) creating a V-shaped valley between interlocking spurs (1 mark) Or any other valid point.

Answers must refer to map evidence, if not mark out of five. Award a maximum of 5 marks for any one land use. If suitability of more than two land uses is explained, then award marks for the best two.	6	If recreation and tourism chosen: • the area would be good because there are lots of opportunities for hillwalking and climbing (1 mark) such as Ben Tee/2497 (1 mark) • there are marked walks at Clunes Forest for visitors to explore (1 mark) • there is a picnic site at 286962 for visitors to enjoy their lunch (1 mark) • there is a caravan and campsite at 287018 for visitors to stay (1 mark) • there is an activity centre for tourists to enjoy activities (1 mark) • visitors who like history may enjoy viewing Invergarry Castle (in grid square 3100) (1 mark) If forestry chosen: • there are suitable areas for forestry such as South Laggan Forest (1 mark) as land is steep and trees can grow on the steep slopes (1 mark) and can survive on thin soils found there (1 mark) • these areas are suitable because there is good road access via the A82 for lorries to take timber away (1 mark) If water storage and supply chosen: • this area would be excellent for water supply as there are a number of natural lochs such as Loch Garry (1 mark) (GR 2302) and Loch Oich (GR 3201) • there are also steep narrow valleys which could be dammed for a reservoir (1 mark) • there are many streams and rivers flowing down from the mountains indicating that this area has plentiful rainfall to supply lochs/reservoirs (1 mark) If farming chosen: • sheep farming would be well suited to the area as sheep can survive on the steep slopes as they are sure-footed (1 mark)

Credit references to urban heat islands. Award a maximum of 3 marks for one factor.	4	Latitude: - places in southern England are warmer because they are nearer the Equator (1 mark) - temperatures further to the north generally decrease because the sun's rays are less concentrated further away from the equator (1 mark) due to the curvature of the Earth (1 mark) Altitude: - upland areas are colder as temperatures decrease with increasing altitude (1 mark) at a rate of 1°C for every 100 metres gained in height (1 mark) Aspect: - in the northern hemisphere south facing slopes can be warmer because they receive more direct sunlight (1 mark) - north facing slopes are colder because they are affected more by cold northerly winds (1 mark) Distance from the sea: - places closer to the sea have warmer/milder winters and cooler summers because oceans heat up slowly in summer and cool slowly in winter (1 mark) - oceans store heat more efficiently than land, acting as 'thermal reservoirs' (1 mark) whereas places further inland have a greater annual range in temperature due to distance from the effects of the oceans (1 mark) - warm ocean currents e.g. the North Atlantic Drift, keep the temperatures warmer on the west coast than on the east coast of the UK (1 mark) Or any other valid point.

Award 0 marks for reverse points.	6	Physical factors: Relief: • flat, low-lying land is easier to build on, so people prefer to live there (1 mark) • many people live near coastal areas as trade can take place easily from ports located by the sea (1 mark) • less people live in upland areas as they are often too cold and wet to grow crops (1 mark) • mountainous areas have low population densities because it is difficult for machinery to operate on steep slopes (1 mark) and they are also often isolated which makes them hard to access (1 mark) Climate: • more people live in temperate climates where there is enough rainfall to provide a supply of water (1 mark) • areas with very high temperatures and low rainfall like the extreme climate of the Sahara Desert make farming difficult so few people live there (1 mark) • areas of permafrost make building houses and roads difficult so few people live there (1 mark) • rainforests are sparsely populated as they are uncomfortable to live in due to the humid climate (1 mark) Soil: • areas with fertile soils are more densely populated as crops can be grown to supply food (1 mark) • where there are poor quality soils few crops can be grown so these areas are more sparsely populated (1 mark) • few people live in hot desert areas because the soil and resulting vegetation make it difficult to keep animals (1 mark)

					Human factors: Employment: • jobs opportunities in urban areas encourage people to locate nearby to find work (1 mark) • cities attract more people as they offer a much wider range of employment and educational opportunities (1 mark) Transport: • higher population densities are found in areas with good transport links making them more accessible (1 mark) • places with good transport links have higher population densities as they attract industries which provide jobs (1 mark) Services: • more people live in towns and cities as they provide access to a variety of amenities and services such as health care and entertainment (1 mark) War: • war/unstable Governments causes lower population densities because it's unsafe for people to live there (1 mark) Or any other valid point.

Accept different reasons for higher yields.	6	If new technology chosen: - the use of new technology like drones and GPS means that farmers can work more efficiently (1 mark) meaning less physical work for farmers (1 mark) - mechanisation can result in unemployment as machines do the work previously carried out by people (1 mark) this can lead to rural depopulation as people move away to find work (1 mark) - the cost of buying and maintaining machinery is expensive which many people in developing countries cannot afford and may get into debt (1 mark) so find it difficult to compete with those who can (1 mark) - the use of fertilisers and pesticides increase crop yields (1 mark), which leads to improved profits for the farmer (1 mark), this can then be used to improve their overall standard of living (1 mark) - increased yields allow a surplus to be produced, encouraging trade to take place (1 mark) - the use of irrigation channels can allow two or three harvests a year instead of one, this increases food supply (1 mark) - overuse of fertilisers and pesticides can be dangerous to people's health (1 mark) and pollutes water supplies (1 mark) - the increased use of machinery and chemicals has created new industries and jobs eg mechanics to fix tractors (1 mark) If GM seeds chosen: - the use of GM seeds gives farmers a more reliable harvest as the seeds are designed to resist disease (1 mark) - some GM seeds can be adapted to grow in adverse conditions for example lack of water ensuring a better food supply (1 mark) - some GM seeds reduce the need for pesticides which is less harmful to insects and bees (1 mark) - some GM seeds require a more reliable source of water/irrigation therefore increasing costs (1 mark) - to buy expensive GM seeds the poorest farmers must take out loans so they end up in debt (1 mark)
